Julie's personal philosophy of education is that every child deserves the opportunity to learn in a positive environment. To Julie, the classroom is more than just an academic area; it is also a social area. Development of social and academic skills and relationships will carry throughout a child's lifetime.

One of Julie's greatest goals each year is to close the gap between students academically and raise each child's level of achievement. She takes the time to sit down one-on-one with each student to gain an understanding of their interests and goals for the year. Each student has a challenge folder which is full of activities that are at their independent level.

Julie was coached in the Comprehensive Literacy Model. In this model which she employs in her daily teaching she learned how to meet individually or in small groups with all students so she can provide more help or more challenge depending on the student's individual need.

A unique program Julie began involves her fourth grade students becoming "big buddies" with a classroom of kindergarten students. Her students act as role models and interact with their little kindergarten buddies monthly. They create shared literacy projects and work on inspiring positive social behaviors. The greatest benefit she sees from this program is the boost in self esteem, that some of her shyest and behaviorally challenged students, seem to gain per the expectations of being a big buddy.

Positive aspects Julie sees in education today are the advances in technology and the collaboration of teachers. School districts are seeing the importance of technology and are continuing to increase funding at all levels of education for schools to buy the latest tools and devises for classrooms.
