This table shows <u>focus genres</u> for the grade per quarter. These will have a more in depth exploration during that quarter. Notice that many of the additional teaching points are the same throughout the year showing the importance of continuous exposure.

This teaching should take place during READ ALOUDS and SHARED READING.
