# Suggested Mini-Lesson Topics

# Grade 2

Lessons are pulled from Grade Level Curriculum Snapshot. They represent concepts that are identified as D (develop) on the District Writing Curriculum. Each lesson could take a single or multiple days. All Items are ESSENTIAL LESSONS that all teachers in that grade level MUST TEACH. This is not a sequence. Mini Lessons should be taught in all areas of the Writing Process throughout the school year.

Teachers are encouraged to supplement this list with the specific needs of their writers.

## **Writer's Workshop Procedures**

- Organization
- Expectations

#### **Prewrite**

- How to brainstorm/gather information
- Introduce IDEA Trait
- How to model choice of genre (see genre studies)
- How to consider audience (self, family, school, community, group/individual)
- How to use teacher provided graphic organizers

## Draft

- How to connect prewrite process
- How to ORGANIZE your writing based on genre structure (format)
- Beginning, Middle, and ending of stories
- How to write and reread own writing with teacher help and independently

## **Conference / Reflect**

- How to reread your writing and prepare for a conference
- How to peer conference
- How to use TRAIT LANGUAGE to improve writing

#### Revise

- How to add to your text
- How to subtract from your text
- How to reword (WORD CHOICE) your text
- How to add personality (VOICE tone, and mood), to your text
- How to adjust word order for fluency (SENTENCE FLUENCY)
- How to improve text by using resource materials (dictionaries, word books...)

#### **Edit**

- How to capitalize per grade level expectations (CONVENTIONS)
- How to punctuate per grade level expectations(CONVENTIONS)
- lacktriangle Apply knowledge of grammar to text (parts of speech  $\sim$  **SENTENCE FLUENCY & WORD CHOICE**)
- How to utilize grade-level editing marks

### **Publish**

- How to complete work neatly
- How to organize your published piece (Title of piece, dedication, illustrations,...)
- How to share and respond to sharing

#### Genre

- How to respond to literature
- How to organize and write a fictional story with a beginning, middle, and end (character, problem, solution, setting...)
- How to write non-formatted & formatted poetry
- How to write Explanatory pieces (writing to explain) \*\*\*"Ranger Rick" & "Spider" magazines a good source\*\*\*
- Procedures for timed writing success (30 minutes prompts)

#### Craft

- How authors personalize their writing
- How to recognize craft in literature
- How to use writer's vocabulary to identify craft (character, dialogue, setting, sequence of events)
- How to reread own writing, and other literature, like a writer
