We just completed our senior portfolio exit interviews with our graduating seniors on Wednesday, May 2. One of the benefits of this program is that it gives our seniors the opportunity to share with an interview team made up of school personnel and Chamber/business people an opportunity to reflect upon their learning.

When asked who had the greatest influence on them as they worked their way from kindergarten to graduation, many credited their parents. Now, a month away from graduating, their maturation and broader perspective helps them understand and see more clearly the sacrifices their parents and loved ones have made on their behalf.

Some of the stories revealed through essays or artifacts contained in the portfolios are just incredible. They shed light on how the eighteen-year-old sitting before you has evolved into a scholar or in some cases a magnificent survivor given obstacles many have overcome. Now, just weeks away from graduation, they ready themselves for their post-high school destinations.

Invariably, in my interviews, every student named a teacher somewhere in their K-12 experience who left an impression, gave encouragement, or had a life changing impact. The quote above states precisely how the great teachers view their life's work! They INVEST their heart and souls into their young charges as they teach their content and influence students by their actions.

Not long ago there was an IBM commercial ad that conveyed the following message I share with you as we celebrate Teacher Appreciation Week:

"Nothing can replace that special relationship that gifted educators develop with their students. Popular culture has long celebrated heroes—the athlete, the adventurer, the statesman—but except for the occasional tale of Mr. Chips, Annie Sullivan, or Jaime Escalante, teachers have not been celebrated in the same way. And classrooms have rarely been identified as the places where the greatest of human dramas unfold—the drama of igniting the human spirit, ennobling the human heart, and enriching the human experience."

Teaching is about the special relationships we develop with our students. And it is a magnificent drama and transformation to watch unfold from age four to eighteen.

Parents of Junior Students – May 20 from 2-3:30 PM...College Admissions Planning and Application Strategies: We will be hosting a meeting for juniors and their parents in our <u>High School Library IMC</u> on Sunday, May 20th from 2:00 to 3:30 PM. We sent a direct mailing to all junior households informing parents and students of this informative session that will enlighten parents and students on how to research schools, apply, seek financial aid including many local scholarships, and prepare for standardized entrance exams. Information will also be provided on how to write impressionable essays and eye catching resumes that admission officers in colleges find favorable. Tips on what to ask reference writers to submit in letters of recommendation, along with advice on interviews with college representatives will also be reviewed.

We are pleased to report that we have held the line on spending with a zero increase in our staffing, despite increased enrollment, in trying to be sensitive to the economic times, yet we will still be able to support our district mission of providing students with programs and opportunities in helping them realize their academic and personal potential. Unlike many districts in this area and throughout the state, we are not reducing staff or programs this upcoming year that impact teaching and learning for our students. We will also introduce the new *employee handbook* that has been developed this year in advance of labor contracts with teachers and support staff expiring June 30, 2012. We thank our citizens for their support of education in our community.

Special Meeting of the Board of Education on May 24: On Thursday, May 24, the Board of Education will hold a special meeting to provide public engagement and feedback regarding the *employee handbook* that will be implemented in the 2012-2013 school year.
